Dear Sugar Lake Residents,

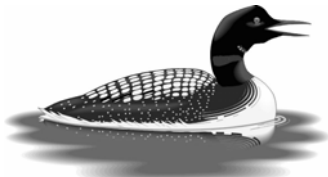

Curly Leaf Pondweed

Over the Memorial Day weekend, we decided to treat an additional area on the west side of the lake just south of Warner's Resort. This is very late in the spring for the treatment, but the DNR invested the authority for us to make the decision about this additional treatment. It will have to be done on 5/30 or 5/31.

Our first treatment was 25 acres in the known areas from last year and a couple new areas that were detected this spring. It is too early to tell exactly how effective the treatment was, but it looks like we are preventing turian production in most areas. We realize that this is a long term program and it will not go away with just a couple years of treatment.

The next step is the cutting and removal of areas of Curly leaf pondweed that still exist. Here is where all of you can help. If you have Curly leaf in the lake near you it should be cut and removed as much as possible. Hand pulling individual plants or CUTTING is preferred to raking because if you cut you do not remove the good native vegetation that help to prevent the spread of Curly. Our areas of greatest infestation are parts of the lake where we disturb the lake bottom the most, or where we have removed native vegetation. Remember DO NOT remove any more "weeds" than you have to to use the lake. The lake does not belong to you, you just own the shore. Sugar Lake needs each and every native plant to help protect it against invasive species, so lets help the lake by not removing any native vegetation. (This sermon brought to you by the weed hugger of the north shore)

If you have more than a few plants to remove, be sure to confirm that they are Curly leaf by asking one of the vegetation committee members to help with the identification. Next, let us know where you are removing plants. Inform your Area Communicator so the vegetation committee can make better plans for next year.

Volunteer to help with the cutting next weekend by contacting Marlin Grant.

Annual Fishing Contest Saturday, June 24th!

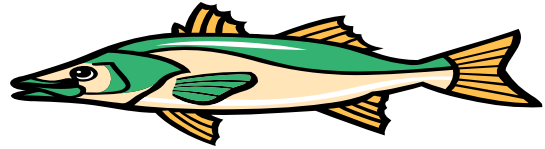
When: 9 a.m. to noon. Registration begins at 8:30 a.m. Weigh in at noon.

Give Our Lake a Break

DO NOT START ANY GRADING UNTIL YOUR EROSION CONTROL IS IN PLACE.

Remember, the sediments and nutrients that get washed into the lake do a great deal of harm and make it difficult for the lake to recover. If you grade, fill, or in any way disturb the soil by or near the lake, just a small rain shower can wash significant sediment into the lake. Use silt fence or hay bails to protect from run off from the site, and remember the current law in Wright County is that disturbed soil should be re-vegetated immediately, or in no case longer that 60 days. Current rules now in effect in other areas state that you need to install sod or seed and erosion mat on the entire area within 7 days. We should consider installing the protection the same day we do the grading to give our lake the best break we can.

Rainfall

April rainfall was 4.32 inches. Thanks to Andy Juetten for providing the rainfall numbers.

Fisheries

The process for implementing experimental fishing regulations for crappie and northern pike on Sugar Lake is moving forward. Very soon now you can expect to see signs posted at the north and south public access. The signs will remain posted for 90 days and will be followed by a public hearing in September. In case you missed the change, the proposed regulations are:

- **The crappie daily limit would be lowered to 5 per day.** This would have the effect of reducing the harvest somewhat and re-distributing the catch.
- **All northern pike between 24-36 inches would have to be released.** This will improve the average size of northern pike and reduce the number of small northern pike.

Remember to renew or obtain your swim raft permit. Contact the Wright County Sheriff's Department at 763-682-7622. Your permit # must be displayed and the raft must be reflectorized to reflect light from all directions.

Minnesota child PFD bill

This new law, effective May 6, 2005, requires a life jacket to be worn by children less than 10 years of age when aboard a watercraft in Minnesota when the craft is underway (not tied up at a dock or permanent mooring.) After **May 1, 2006**, the penalty for an offense changes from a written warning to a petty misdemeanor. There are three exemptions:

- When in an enclosure or below decks on a watercraft.
- When in an anchored boat that is a platform for swimming or diving.
- When aboard a charter (passenger) craft with a licensed captain.

New Business

- The board voted unanimously to spend up to \$200 to move the cattail bog currently staked in front of the discharge culvert at the north end of the lake.
- Tim Pippo will resume taking care of the carp trap.
- Jerry Euteneuers resignation from the board was accepted and Mary Williamson was appointed to complete his term.

Curly Leaf Pondweed

Soon it will be time to begin cutting and harvesting curly leaf pondweed. This activity is planned for the end of May into the first part of June. Marlin Grant will be coordinating this effort. In addition to the resources currently lined up Marlin needs help with the following:

- One to two more duck boats
- One to two more 15 to 25 hp motors
- Large landing nets
- Four five-tine forks
- About 16 volunteers to work in two shifts of 8 each

Please consider volunteering to help with the cutting and harvesting effort. More volunteers will make the work easier.

Mechanical harvesting of curly leaf pondweed helps because the plant dies back in the early summer at the same time the algae population is growing rapidly. The plant breaks off and floats free in the lakespreading its seed in the form of turions, a seed pod. The curly leaf decomposition increases the amount of phosphorus in the lake and contributes to algae blooms.

Any curly leaf the association cuts will be harvested.

Corinna Township Comprehensive Plan

With two visioning sessions complete the planning task force is working on goal and policy development and future land use mapping. There will be a public review and comment opportunity this fall followed by public hearing also this fall. The task force meetings are open to the public. Go to the Corinna Township web page, www.corinnatownship.com, and click on the land use page to see a meeting schedule and contact information for all the planning task force members.

Wright County is considering an ordinance requiring Corinna property owners to obtain permits, variances, etc, from the county as well as from the township, should Corinna elect to do its own planning and zoning. This topic was on the agenda May 11. Tom Salkowski (Wright County Planning Administrator) reviewed the historical record of townships and the planning and zoning function in Wright County. To allow time for public comment this item was continued to the July 20, 2006, hearing at 7:30 p.m.

Corinna Township Gravel Mining Hearing

On Tuesday, June 6, at 7 p.m. the town board will consider an interim ordinance establishing a moratorium on the establishment or expansion of gravel mining operations in the Township of Corinna and establishing a time frame for a planning and zoning study to be conducted by the Corinna Town Board and Corinna Planning Task Force. The moratorium ordinance will provide for a one year study period for a Goal, Policies, and Implementation Strategies to be identified and for the potential adoption of enhanced zoning controls that will provide for consistency and/or increased standards as may be currently required by the Wright County Zoning Ordinance Regulations.

Gravel mining in Wright County has become a contentious issue, particularly around lakes. Concerns include possible ground water contamination, water level impact, and the disruption of residential areas around the lakes. See the full hearing notice at the Corinna Township website listed above. Plan to attend if you are a Corinna resident and have any concerns about gravel mining in the township.

LVMP Status

The Sugar Lake LVMP (Lake Vegetation Management Plan) is complete. Work on the LVMP began last year at a May general membership meeting. Following a presentation on curly leaf pondweed control by Lake Restoration, the board agreed to take an aggressive approach towards control, to launch a fundraising program, and unanimously passed a motion to begin work on the LVMP. Steve McComas of Blue Water Science was contracted to prepare the plan. His work was supplemented by Association members who compiled historical information and assisted with the sampling activity. In May of 2006 the LVMP document was completed and posted to the web site. The goals and action steps were reviewed at the May 20 board meeting where the Sugar Lake Association Board unanimously adopted the plan. The next step will be to submit the plan to the DNR for validation. The full text of the plan is available on the Sugar Lake website at www.sugarlake.org. In summary, the main goals of the LVMP are as follows:

- Aggressively manage invasive species to prevent the displacement of native plants.
- Maintain the present native plant diversity.
- Have a "no net loss" philosophy for shoreline emergent vegetation by vigorously protecting existing emergent plants.
- Attempt to expand emergent vegetation in all areas of the lake capable of supporting emergent plants.

Township Dog Ordinances.....By Cori Duffee

Owning a dog can be a lot of fun and very rewarding. Since many property owners around Sugar Lake have dogs, it was suggested to provide a summary of the dog ordinances in our area. While the ordinances do not address the issue of droppings or waste left behind by dogs, please remember that owners, as a common courtesy, shall be responsible for cleaning up after the mess their dog(s) make.

Please also remember that you may go across township lines while out for a stroll with your dog, it is your responsibility to know and obey the ordinances of both townships.

Corinna Township

No person, owner or keeper shall keep or harbor a dog, within the platted residential area that:

- Habitually barks, howls or cries. Any such dog is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and shall be impounded and destroyed.
- Is known to be vicious or destructive. Any such dog is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and shall be impounded and destroyed.
- Runs at large within the platted residential area in Corinna Township.

Dogs may be upon the streets of public property when such dog is on a leash and kept under control of the accompanying person, or when such dog is not on a leash, but is under the immediate and complete control of the person charged with its care, either by voice control or otherwise.

The terms "platted residential area" refers to housing developments where there are three or more homestead lots abutted to each other. It would not apply to homesteads where there are agriculture or pasture land between lots.

Penalty: Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed \$700.00 and/or by imprisonment not to exceed 90 days, or both.

Clearwater Township

- No dog shall be permitted to run at large within the platted residential areas of this Town.
- No person owning or harboring a dog shall permit the same to run at large within the platted residential areas of this town.
- Any dog running at large within the platted residential areas of this Town shall be subject to seizure by the animal warden or any peace officer or by any person whose premises the dog may be at large.
- No person shall keep or harbor a dog that habitually or frequently barks, howls, or cries between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. and in doing so disturbs several persons. Any such dog is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and may be impounded under the procedures set forth in this Ordinance.
- No person shall keep or harbor a dog that is known to be vicious or destructive. Any dog of the following types is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and subject to impoundment under the procedures set forth in this Ordinance:
 - Any dog that commits damage to the person or property of anyone other than the owner except as shall be committed in the defense of such owner, or in the defense of his family, or in the defense of his property.
 - Any dog that snarls at persons, bites persons or other animals or habitually exhibits vicious tendencies.
 - Any dog that chases vehicles or interferes with persons walking, or riding horseback, or interferes with the driving of automobiles, bicycles, motorcycles, motorbikes, snowmobiles, or other vehicles, on public grounds, streets or highways within the limits of this Town.

The term "running at large" of dogs shall mean permitting any dog to go on or about the public streets, alleys or other places within the platted residential areas of the Town, except premises of the owner or harbinger thereof, and excepting on a leash, in an automobile, or similar confinement, and all times under control of a responsible person. A dog shall not be determined to be at large if engaged in wild game or animal hunting and under the control of its owner or a responsible person, or when engaged in obedience training and under control of its owner or a responsible person.

Penalty: Any person, firm or corporation found guilty of violating any provision of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$700.00, by imprisonment not to exceed 90 days, or both.

State Regulations on Controlling Aquatic Plants

Since we are focused on our Lake Vegetation Management Plan and the control of aquatic invasive species now, it is a good time to review the regulations regarding aquatic plants. The emergent plants referred to are cattail and bulrush. A check earlier this May showed no valid permits on Sugar Lake to do any plant removal.

From the booklet "A guide to Aquatic Plants" published by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources

Under Minnesota law, aquatic plants growing in public waters are the property of the state. Because of their value to the lake ecosystem, they may not be destroyed or transplanted unless authorized by the Commissioner of the Department of Natural Resources.

Activities NOT Allowed

- Destroying or preventing the growth of aquatic plants by laying a plastic mat on the lake bottom.
- Removing aquatic vegetation within posted fish-spawning areas.
- Removing aquatic plants from an undeveloped shoreline.
- Removing aquatic plants where they do not interfere with swimming, boating, or other recreation.

Control Methods which MUST HAVE a permit

- Destruction of any emergent plants.
- Cutting or pulling by hand, or by mechanical means, aquatic vegetation in an area larger than 2500 square feet.
- Applying herbicides or algicides.
- Moving or removing a bog of any size that is free-floating or lodged in any area other than its place of origin in protected waters. (A "protected water" is generally any body of water 2.5 acres or larger within an incorporated city limit or 10 acres or larger in rural areas.)
- Transplanting aquatic plants into protected waters.
- Use of automated untended aquatic plant control devices.
- Physical removal of floating-leaf vegetation from an area larger than a channel 15 feet wide extending to open water.

When a permit is NOT needed

You may cut or pull submerged vegetation to create or maintain a swimming or boat docking area without a DNR permit under certain conditions: First, the area to be cleared must be no larger than 2500 square feet. Second, the cleared area must not extend more than 50 feet along the shoreline or one-half the length of your shoreline, whichever is less. A boat channel up to 15 feet wide, and as long as necessary to reach open water, may also be cleared. The cutting or pulling may be done by hand or with hand operated or powered equipment that does not significantly alter the course, current, or cross-section of the lake bottom. Cut or pulled aquatic plants must be disposed of on land. In addition, a channel 15 feet wide through floating-leaf vegetation (other than yellow lotus, a protected wild flower) extending to open water may be maintained by mechanical means without a permit. Any other destruction of floating-leaf vegetation requires a permit. If you have any questions on control activities that do not require a permit, call your local DNR office. A DNR permit is not required to gather aquatic plants for personal use (except for wild rice and yellow lotus) or for constructing a shooting or observation blind.

Applying for a permit

To apply for a permit, contact the DNR's Ecological Services Section or regional DNR office.
